Harvard graduate and member of the bar; Massachusetts legislature, 1899, 1901-08; lieutenant governor of Massachusetts, 1912; chairman, committee on rules and procedure of Massachusetts constitutional convention, 1917-19; chairman, commission on cost of living, 1910 and 1916-17; member of Congress, 1919, 1935 and 1937. Author of Legislative Procedure, Legislative Assemblies, Legislative Principles, Legislative Problems, Congress: An Explanation.

A.M. - Visit individual Congressmen in their office; attend committee meetings and the sessions of the House and Senate.

12:30 P.M. - Luncheon, Harrington Hotel, 11th and E Streets, N.W., Ball Room on Mezzanine. A special ticket is issued for the luncheon.
Speaker: Mr. Barnet Nover, Associate Editor of the Washington Post.

2:30 P.M. - The Honorable Henry A. Wallace, Secretary of Agriculture.

Iowa State College graduate; Editor of Wallace's Farmer, 1921-33; delegate to the International Conference of Agricultural Economists, 1929; Secretary of Agriculture since 1933.

5:00 P.M. - The United States Civil Service Commission: President Harry B. Mitchell, Mrs. Lucille Foster McMillin and Dr. Leonard D. White. Place: Room 200, United States Civil Service Commission, 7th and F Streets, N.W.

Commissioner Mitchell has been a printer, newspaper publisher, and livestock and dairyman; mayor of Great Falls, Montana, 1923-29; President of the United States Civil Service Commission since 1933.

Mrs. Lucille Foster McMillin is the wife of the late Governor Benton McMillin of Tennessee who was Minister to Guatemala and Peru; was appointed to the United States Civil Service Commission in 1932; in 1935 received the degree Doctor of Humane Letters from Lincoln Memorial University.

Dr. White is a graduate of Dartmouth College; member, faculty of the University of Chicago; formerly, the Chicago Municipal Civil Service Commission; the United States Civil Service Commission since 1934.
Dr. White is an outstanding authority in the field of public administration.

- 9:00 A.M. - Tour of the Library of Congress, 1st Street between East Capitol and B Streets, S.E. Meet in the main hallway of the Library. The tour will be conducted by a guide.
- 11:15 A.M. - Reception by Chief Justice Hughes in his chambers, the Supreme Court Building, No. 1 First Street, N.E. The group will meet on the steps of the main front entrance of the Supreme Court Building at 11:00 A.M. Please note that it is important that the group be punctual.
- Chief Justice Hughes is a graduate of Colgate, received his A. M. from Brown University, LL. B. from Columbia University, the degree Doctor honoris causa from the Universities of Brussels and Louvain. Practiced law in New York; member of faculty of Cornell University and New York Law School; counsel for various large corporations; Governor of New York from 1907-10; candidate for President, 1916; Secretary of State in the Cabinets of Presidents Harding and Coolidge; appointed Chief Justice of the Supreme Court by President Hoover in 1930.

- 1:30 P.M. - Tour of Washington, Georgetown, Alexandria and Mount Vernon, arranged to

- 8:00 P.M. - Joseph B. Eastman, member of the Interstate Commerce Commission and Harper Sibley, President of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. Place: Room "I" of the United States Chamber of Commerce Building, 1615 H Street, N.W.

Mr. Eastman received his B.A. and LL. D. degrees from Amherst College. Was secretary of the Public Franchise League of Boston, 1906-13; counsel for employees of various street railway companies in wage arbitration cases, 1913-14; member, the Massachusetts Public Service Commission, 1915-19; Federal Coordinator of Transportation, 1933-36; member of the Interstate Commerce Commission since 1919.

Mr. Sibley received his A. B. degree from Harvard University and his LL. B. from New York Law School. Law practice since 1908; ranch and farm manager; vice-president, Sibley Coal and Coke Company, Hollister Lumber Company; director, Leckie Smokeless Coal Company; trustee, Security Trust Company of Rochester, Rochester Savings Bank, Provident Loan Society; vice-president, New York Joint Stock Land Bank; president, Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

Wednesday, March 31, 1937

9:30 A.M. - W. A. Jump, Director of Office of Budget and Finance of the Department of Agriculture. Place: Room 113, Main building of the Department of Agriculture, 14th and Independence Avenue, S. W.

Mr. Jump is one of Washington's outstanding career officers. He entered the Service as a young man and has worked up through various positions until today as Budget Officer and Director of Finance of the Department of Agriculture he occupies one of the most powerful positions in his field of activity.

12:15 P.M. - Senator James F. Byrnes of South Carolina. Place: Senate Appropriations Room on the first floor of the Senate.

Senator Byrnes was admitted to the bar, 1903; editor, Journal and Review, Aiken, South Carolina, 1903-07; official court reporter, 2nd Circuit, South Carolina, 1900-08, Solicitor, 1908-10; member of Congress, 1911-25; law practice, Spartanburg, South Carolina, 1925-31; United States Senate since 1931.

2:00 P.M. - Tour of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Place: Room 5633, the reception room of J. Edgar Hoover, Department of Justice Building. Enter building at 9th and Pennsylvania Avenue.

4:00 P.M. - Attorney General Homer Cummings. Place: Room 5109, Department of Justice Building.

The Attorney General has Ph. B. and LL. B. degrees from Yale University. Mayor, Stamford, Connecticut, for three terms; corporation counsel, 1908-12; member, Democratic National Committee for Connecticut, 1900-25; candidate at large for Congress, Connecticut, 1902 and for United States Senate, 1916; temporary chairman, Democratic National Convention in San Francisco, 1920; floor leader for Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt in Chicago, 1932; Attorney General since March 4, 1932.

5:00 P.M. - Drew Pearson, Washington Correspondent. Place: Room 7057, Department of Commerce Building, 14th and Constitution Avenue. Enter building at main entrance on 14th Street.

Mr. Pearson is a graduate of Swarthmore College. Was director, the American Friends Service Commission in Serbia, Montenegro and Albania, 1919-21; member, faculty the University of Pennsylvania, 1921-22, Colgate University, 1924. Has been on the staff of the United States Daily, Baltimore Sun, and Havas Agency; reported the 6th Pan American Conference at Havana, the London Naval Conference, and the Cuban Revolution. Co-author, Washington Merry-Go-Round, More Merry-Go-Round, American Diplomatic Game, The Nine Old Men, and a daily newspaper column, Daily Washington Merry-Go-Round.

Assistant Secretary Draper, Amherst College graduate. President, American Creosoting Company, 1912-20; vice president, Hills Brothers Company--packers of Dromedary dates and other food products, 1920-35; member, National Labor Board, 1934-35; Assistant Secretary of Commerce since 1935.
